



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***Promised Land* — February 2018 screening**

Our chapter partnered in February with Oregon City's End of the Oregon Trail Interpretive Center to present an after-hours showing of *Promised Land* to benefit the Chinook Indian Nation.

Over 100 chapter members and guests viewed the film, preceded by a welcome ceremony from Chinook and local tribal members and followed by a panel discussion with the film-makers and several subjects of the film.



Clatsops & Killamox — Doug Deur at Cannon Beach H.S.

Dr. Douglas Deur, an internationally recognized researcher on the Native American cultures and environmental history of North-western North America, presented “Revisiting Clatsops & Killamox: The Corps of Discovery and the Villages of the Ocean Coast” at the Cannon Beach History Center and Museum on Saturday, March 3, 2018.

He is a research professor in the Portland State University Department of Anthropology, Adjunct Professor of Environmental Studies at the University of Victoria School

of Environmental Studies, and a member of the Oregon Parks and Recreation Commission.

Over 20 Chapter members and guests enjoyed the talk, which provided the historical context for Clatsop/Tillamook life in the region in 1805–06—several made a weekend of it and visited Les Shirley Park and discussed Clark’s trip to the whale and McNeal’s Folly.

It was a good chance to become familiar with the area for prospective volunteer docents/guides during the annual meeting of the Foundation, which the Chapter is hosting in Astoria in October.
