


Canoe Camp among the maze of channels and sloughs





Featured Speakers



Emily Arendt, PhD

Dr. Arendt is an assistant professor of history at MSUB, teaching courses on early American history and women's history. Publications include articles in *Annals of Wyoming* and *The Journal of the Early Republic*. She is a regular contributor to the Fox New's documentary series *Legends and Lies: The Patriots* which cuts through the myths and brings untold truths of early United States history to life.

Keith Edgerton, PhD

Dr. Edgerton teaches early American history, environmental history, and Montana history at MSUB. He has spoken on a variety of western history topics including the history of the Montana prison, the Montana Insane Asylum, and his true passion, Lewis and Clark. He has published books on the history of the Montana Highway Patrol and one entitled Montana Justice: Power, Punishment, and the Penitentiary.

C. Adrian Heidenreich, PhD

Dr. Heidenreich is Professor Emeritus, Native American Studies/Anthropology at MSUB. He is an adopted member in the Crow (Apsaalooke) Tribe. His teaching career spans 29 years at MSUB and 9 years at Rocky Mountain College. Also, he is a board member of Friends of Chief Plenty Coups State Park. His scholarly works include, "Smoke Signals in Crow Country, Beyond the Capture of Horses from the Lewis and Clark Expedition" and many articles on Native American culture and history.

Thomas C. Rust, PhD

Dr. Rust is a Professor of History at MSUB where he has taught since 1999. His work in American military history, more specifically Fort Ellis was published in the journal "Military History of West" and recently the monograph "Lost Fort Ellis: A Frontier History of Bozeman, Montana." He has been the primary investigator on over 20 archaeological projects and from 2011 to 2014 he lead the multidisciplinary effort to verify the location of the Clark Canoe Camp on the Yellowstone River which was published in the journal, Archaeology in Montana and We Proceeded On.

Kevin Kooistra

Kevin Kooistra in the Executive Director of the Western Heritage Center in Billings. His work at the Center includes management, grant-writing, public programing, exhibit development. He also serves as community historian, archaeologist, cultural anthropologist, and scriptwriter.

Mardell Hogan Plainfeather

Mardell Hogan Plainfeather is a member of the Apsaalooke Nation from the Big Lodge Clan, a child of the Whistling Water Clan. She retired from the NPS as a supervisory park ranger in interpretation, as well as from the Little Big Horn College, and from the Western Heritage Center as a field director for the American Indian tribal project. She is co-author of "The Woman Who Loved Mankind: The Life of a Twentieth Century Crow Elder", about the life of her mother, Lillian Bullshows Hogan, the oldest living Crow Indian at the dawn of the 21st century.



Charles Fritz

In 2013 Charles Fritz was awarded the Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation's Distinguished Service Award for his enduring contribution to the history of the Expedition. His collection, "An Artist with the Corps of Discovery~100 Paintings Illustrating the Journals of Lewis and Clark" has toured to twelve museums from Oregon to Georgia. Fritz authored an accompanying book which won the Benjamin Franklin Silver Medal Award for History in 2010 and is currently in its third printing. He has an extensive list of awards and recognitions and his work is featured in many books and periodicals such as <u>We Proceeded On</u>.

Ralph Saunders

Mr. Saunders is an emeritus member of the American Society of Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing, being certified as an aerial photogrammetrist. His experience is in the science of mapping, hydrographic surveys, river channel studies, and providing expert testimony. He is the author or coauthor of several publications involving Lewis and Clark and Manuel Lisa's Fort Raymond. He was published in the November 2011 issue of <u>We Proceeded On</u> concerning the search for Clark's Canoe Camp on the Yellowstone.

Terry Lee Zee

The "Visions of Lewis and Clark" kite collection was created by Terry Lee Zee in 2003 and was displayed at Billings Logan Airport for three years. After reading Captain Lewis's journals, thirty quotes were selected by her and distributed to America's best kite builders for interpretation as a kite. Terry has given over 200 tours of the exhibit and loves telling stories about America's greatest exploration. Since 2007, the incredible collection has been traveling across America.

Loren Yellow Bird, Sr.

Loren Yellow Bird, Sr. is a traditional Arikara singer, sun dancer, historian and member of the Sahnish (Arikara) nation. He worked as the Chief of Interpretation at Fort Union Trading Post National Historic Site and currently serves as a NPS Park Ranger and Cultural Resources Interpreter. Yellow Bird has published in many articles and publications. Loren was the technical advisor for the 2016 Oscar winning film, "The Revenant". He is also featured on other films and documentaries, and is a featured speaker, keynote, and presenter.

Tim Lehmann PhD

Dr. Lehmann is Professor of History at Rocky Mountain College where he teaches a variety of courses in American, Western, and Environmental history. He has published two books: *Public Values, Private Lands: American Farmland and Preservation Policy, 1933-1985* and *Bloodshed at Little Bighorn: Sitting Bull, Custer, and the Destinies of Nations.* He is a past board member of the Montana Committee for the Humanities, now Humanities Montana.

John Pulasky

Mr. Pulasky has been an Adjunct instructor at Rocky Mountain College since 1988. He is a well-known weathercaster on Northern Ag Network and is the host of That's Montana LLC. He was instrumental in starting Back to the Future with Lewis & Clark: Technology Then and Now, for which the group received the LCTHF Trail Stewardship Award


